Spotlight on Facilities Management Employees

Ron Tarbutton, Director of FM Operations & Maintenance was recently appointed as the CAPPA representative to the Professional Affairs Committee for a 3 year term ending in July, 2018.

APPA used to stand for the Association of Physical Plant Administrators in the late 1960's through the early 1990's. Today, the association is known as APPA: Leadership in Educational Facilities, and is most easily recognized and referred to as simply "APPA".

The Professional Affairs Committee (PAC) has a key role in ensuring recognition of "institutional" excellence by considering applications for such institutional awards as the Award for Excellence in Facilities Management (AFE), the Effective & Innovative Practices (E&I), and the Sustainability Award. In addition, PAC is responsible for the development of APPA's Public Policy Agenda via a Code Advocacy Task Force and provides oversight of the Facilities Management Evaluation Program (FMEP).



In his committee role, Ron will be evaluating those institutions that have submitted applications for the APPA Awards listed above. This aids OSU FM by giving Ron insight into the "best of the best" innovative enhancements made by facilities institutions around the country. That insight can be used to help OSU FM in our continued refinement of the Next Level initiative! The Next Level Team used many of the APPA guidelines in developing the current zone structures.


Kyle Brandon Coyle, OK.

OSU Landscape Manager Goes Back to His Roots

STILLWATER — the horticulture degree Steve Dobbs earned at Oklahoma State University in 1981 set him on a career path that led right back to the Stillwater campus. As OSU's grounds and landscape manager, Dobbs oversees more than 800 acres — excluding the athletic and intramural fields — that require constant maintenance and occasional ornamentation.

From growing flowers in the greenhouse to trimming shrubs across campus, 50 full-time employees stay busy with the upkeep.

They are grouped according to zones and assisted by about 20 part-time student workers who are hired each year. "I remind my staff all the time, even mowing the lawn, there is both an art and a science behind it," said Dobbs, 56.

When he took the job in 2010, a lot of the staff's time was consumed by mowing and dragging water hoses here and there. "You don't get much else done, and that's not the proper way," he said. Today, an irrigation system keeps lawns and gardens watered properly so workers have more time to design and install landscape displays. Every new building project includes landscaping in its budget.

Part of Dobbs' role is to carry out the campus landscape master plan implemented in 2011. Orange is always part of the color scheme; some years it might be 25 percent, and other years it can be 100 percent, Dobbs said.

The 125th anniversary design that adorned the Edmon Low Library lawn earlier this year included designs ranging from a horse-drawn wagon to a birthday cake.

Year-round effort

Dobbs and his crew don't hibernate during the winter months. Their work continues; it just changes.

The five large topiaries on campus are moved into the greenhouse. Leaves are raked into compost piles. Trees must be pruned and holiday lights hung. Dobbs orders seeds and cuttings for the following year's lawn design and grows the plants in the greenhouse. Hands down, the least favorite job of all is snow and ice removal.

"You just don't know how to plan for it," Dobbs said, "and it always comes at inopportune times. "A year-round duty is picking up litter, including after tailgating. "That's a fun one," Dobbs said. "But many fans do a good job of bagging their own trash."

First impressions

Growing up in Sallisaw, Dobbs was involved with 4-H. He always had a plant project and an animal project. When he left for college, he had to pick one. Horticulture won and has been his passion ever since. After graduating from OSU, he worked both in state and out and earned a master's degree in horticulture from the University of Arkansas.

"We were so lucky to find him and get him back," OSU President Burns Hargis said. "We weren't doing much more than mowing the lawn and clipping the hedges. "Steve really is a very gifted artist. He really gets it. He's a guy that figures out how to get it done. And he's creative."

Hargis and Dobbs agree maintaining a beautiful campus is important both for those who already call it home and for people who come to Stillwater for the first time.

"It's like your front yard. It's a symbol of your pride in place," Hargis said. "The campus sells to new people who are considering it because not only is it very lovely, but it also makes a statement. "That's the first impression

they have of OSU when they drive up and see the campus. And usually the reaction is 'Wow.' "Top that off with the friendliness of the people, and it makes OSU a place where people want to go, Hargis said.

Urban forest

"People are really noticing," Dobbs said. "It's an exciting time here.

"He gets a lot of feedback from alumni who visit campus in the form of comments, emails and sometimes donations to the OSU Foundation. Visitors can learn about various plants and trees on campus from QR codes installed alongside them. Some people take that knowledge home to use in their own yards and gardens, Dobbs said. The grounds crew and students have tracked every tree on campus through a global positions system. It serves as a tree inventory and helps Dobbs keep the urban forest healthy. The campus was recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation as a Tree Campus USA for effectively managing trees and engaging students.

"We have beautiful trees on campus," Hargis said. "They're a huge asset. "Dobbs gives the credit for the beautiful campus to his "unbelievable staff. ""I just want to brag on them as much as I can. What's so special about them is they all have a passion for it." The article was written by Kathryn McNutt for the Oklahoman and NewOK.

Central Plant Update

Construction is well underway at the New Central Plant. The excavation is underway with shoring now being installed for further deepening of the hole to the full 30 feet depth. The Structural steel and concrete packages have been bid and awarded. The design is now complete and all efforts are in full swing.

The boilers have been awarded to English Boilers for a total of \$3,620,000 and the



cooling towers were awarded to SPX/Marley Cooling Towers at \$912,000. Our team is now preparing for the purchase of the Chillers and VFDs and the Deaerator and Surge tanks. Our new Mechanical Engineer, Phil Curley has joined our team and is the project manager for the equipment purchase and installation.

- ♣ December 31st is a mandatory leave day
- Over the Holiday break, remember these important steps for energy savings:
 - o Turn off all possible electronic equipment, including computers, monitors, speakers, printers etc.
 - o Unplug items such as fans, chargers, radios, and appliances, such as coffeemakers
 - Close blinds and tilt the slats upward
 - o Remember that temperatures may be cooler than normal as heat may not be scheduled in some areas
 - o As always, turn off the lights as you leave.

- FM IT is planning to upgrade AiM to a new 8.2 release
 - Scheduled for mid-January, more details to come from FM IT
 - Training for those who will be affected by the new release was conducted by Jeff Sweeden and Marla Boles on Nov. 18 – Nov. 20th
 - The Standard Operating Procedures and Training documents located on the FM website have been updated to reflect the new release and will be posted to the FM Website when the conversion to the 8.2 release occurs in Jan.
 - The 8.2 release has minimal impact on most workers. What most will see is the "look" of the screens has changed with different colors and the deletion of the picture icons. The largest benefit for FM to upgrade to 8.2 is for the changes to the AiM IQ module which will allow the Business Operations team the ability to create more robust FM metrics and graphs for Key Performance Indicators. Key Performance Indicators help to guide FM in accomplishing the strategic goals established by senior management.
- ≠ Employee Survey results are currently being compiled by Huron Educational Consulting and are due to FM mid-December. Results will be communicated to all employees early 2016. Thank you to all who participated in the employee survey. It is important to FM that employee's thoughts and concerns are captured so that FM is working on the improvements that are most important to the employees.
- FM also conducted Customer Service Surveys in November to over 900 OSU campus customers. Huron Educational is compiliing those results and will deliver to FM late December. Results will be communicated to all employees early 2016.
